Summary

Below we've presented a summary of Rotorua District's key metrics this quarter:



Out of region consumer spend



28.4%

During the quarter to March 2023, 28.4% of consumer spending in Rotorua District came from visitors to the region, with an increase of 13.21% compared with December 2022. 71.6% of consumer spending came from local residents.



Gambling spend per capita

As of December 2022, an average of \$122.0 was spent by individuals over 18 years in Rotorua District through electronic gaming machines, with a decrease of 1.14% compared with September 2022.



Deprivation Index



As of March 2023, the deprivation within Rotorua District is 9.0 and this is unchanged since February 2023.



Years to save for a house deposit

As of March 2023, it would take 12.0 years to save for a 20% home deposit in Rotorua District, with a decrease of 2.98% compared with December 2022.



Crime rate

In March 2023, Rotorua District had a crime rate of 79.4 incidents per 10,000 people, with an increase of 5.66% compared with December 2022.



Job seeker support rate

In March 2023, 10.1% of the working population (15-64 years) in Rotorua District claimed Job Seeker Support, with a decrease of 9.71% compared with March 2022.



Comparison to National Crime Rate



Compared with the same time last year the crime rate in Rotorua District has increased by 22.3%, and is now 79.4 as at March 2023. The crime rate is 60.1% above the national rate of 49.6.

Crime Rate by Deprivation Index



In Rotorua District, communities with a deprivation index of 10 have the highest crime rate. The crime rate in these communities is 11.7 times higher than those with a deprivation index of 2, the group with the lowest crime rate. Communities with a deprivation index of 4 have seen the greatest change in their crime rate over the last 3 months, with an increase of 16.1%.

Crime Types with the Greatest Change



Within Rotorua District, the most prevalent type of crime in March 2023 was 'Theft From Retail Premises. The type of crime that had the greatest change in the last 3 months was 'Robbery, Extortion and Related Offences', with an increase of 18.3%.



Comparison to National Deprivation Index



Compared to the same time last year, the deprivation index of Rotorua District has seen no change by 0%, and is now 9 in March 2023. The deprivation index is 63.6% above the national median index of 5.5.


The community with the greatest change in deprivation score since the same time last year was Ngongotahā Valley, with a 2.2% increase.

Distribution of Deprivation Index



In Rotorua District, 58.5% of the population live in highly deprived communities (deprivation index 8-10), whereas 9.8% live in high socio-economic performing communities (deprivation index 1-3).

Benefit Deprivation Indicators



The benefit deprivation indicator that has changed the most in the last year is Means Tested Benefit Rate (MTBR) which saw a 10.42% increase. The bars above represent Single Parent Support rate (SPSR), Means Tested Benefit rate (MTBR) and Job Seeker Support rate (JSSR).

Each month meshblocks are assigned a deprivation score. Meshblocks are then ranked separately into deciles, known as deprivation indices. A deprivation index of 1 represents the least deprived areas and a deprivation of 10 the most deprived.

As of March 2023 there were 10025 registered businesses in Rotorua District. Over the last 12 months the number of registered businesses has increased by 188. Nationally, the number of registered businesses has increased.

Business openings and closings in the last year



Comparing March 2023 with March 2022 Rotorua District has seen a decrease in the number of new business registrations of 28% and a decrease in the number of business deregistrations of 94.7%.

Distribution of Registered Businesses by Industry



Rental, Hiring and Real Estate Services is the largest industry operating in Rotorua District and makes up 18.1% of all currently registered businesses.



In March 2023, 25.1% of Eftpos spending in Rotorua District came from people living outside of the district. This is an increase of 23.6% since the same time last year.



School leavers with NCEA3 level by ethnicity




In 2021, Asian students in Rotorua District had the greatest proportion of students leaving with NCEA3. This is 2.11 times larger than Māori students, who have the lowest proportion of students leaving with NCEA Level 3. Māori students have seen the greatest change in NCEA Level 3 pass rates, with an increase of 21%. Māori NCEA Level 3 pass rates in Rotorua District are 102% of National Māori rates.

Schools with greatest change in NCEA3 pass rate

In 2021, the school with the greatest change in the percentage of students leaving with NCEA Level 3 (pass rate) since 2020 was Rotorua Girls' High School, with a 13.33% decrease. Note that the table includes only those schools with more than 50 students.

School leavers with NCEA3 level by gender




Since 2014, on average the percentage of students leaving with NCEA Level 3 in Rotorua District for female students has been 1.18 times larger than male students. In 2021, the percentage of students leaving with NCEA Level 3 for female students compared with male students was less than average Compared to national figures, in 2021 the pass rate in Rotorua District were lower for both females and males.







Secondary school retention by ethnicity



In 2021, Asian students in Rotorua District had the greatest retention rate. This is 1.78 times larger than MELAA students, who have the lowest retention rate. MELAA students have seen the greatest change in retention, with no change Māori retention rates in Rotorua District are 92% of National Māori rates.

Schools with greatest change in retention

In 2021, the school with the greatest change in retention rate since 2020 was Rotorua Girls' High School, with a 9.17% decrease. Note that the table includes only those schools with more than 50 students.

Secondary school retention by gender



On average, since 2014, the retention rate in Rotorua District of female students has been 1.07 times larger than male students. In 2021, the retention rates of female students compared with male students was less than average Compared to national figures, in 2021 the retention rates in Rotorua District were lower for both females and males.







Within Rotorua District, the benefit rate by ethnicity with the greatest increase in the last 12 months was Means Tested Benefit for Māori, up 11.03% to a value of 5.59 claimants per 100 working adults (15-64yrs). Comparatively, Job Seeker Support for European saw the greatest decrease over the last 12 months, down 13.35% to 5.02 claimants per 100 working adults.

Median Household Income over time



As of March 2023, the median household income (adjusted for inflation) in Rotorua District was \$80,848. This is 13.7% less than the national median.

Home Ownership by Deprivation Index



In Rotorua District, communities with a deprivation index of 2 have the highest rates of home ownership. The home ownership rate in these communities is 1.7 times greater than those communities with a deprivation index of 10 (the deprivation decile with the lowest home ownership rate). Deprivation and home ownership are as at March 2018.

Greatest Change in Rental Affordabilty

Pomare saw the greatest change in the percentage of income spent on rent over the last 3 months, with a 7.59% increase. Of these communities, Ngongotaha East was the most unaffordable in March 2023, with 35.2% of annual household income spent on rent.

Greatest Change in Purchasing Affordability

Pleasant Heights saw the greatest change in the percentage of income spent on mortgage repayments, with a 9.1% decrease over the last 3 months. Of these communities, Victoria was the most unaffordable in March 2023, with 11.2% of annual household income spent on mortgage repayments.

Purchasing affordability is based on purchasing at a median house price with a 20% deposit over 30 years assuming a fixed interest rate of 4%. Both purchasing and rental affordability is based on annual household income.
